
Let the earth inspire you! Think about some 'earthy' words, such as:



A place with muddy, earthy ground or a sandy beach (if you don't have either of these, but you do have some pebbles, turn to the next 'You Are a Poet' challenge!)


Use the stick to write a poem in the mud or the sand. Is your poem inspired by the earth itself? Try making the letters different sizes.
